We may be Jackrabbits, but in my experience it is invariably the tortoise that wins the race. The magic that is PACE happens in classrooms among teachers that yearn to teach and students that consistently strive to learn. Nutrition, adequate sleep, and opportunities to recreate are all critical factors in a student's life, but the single most important factor in our success as an academic program is our students' impetus to learn all that they can and their recognition that the opportunity should never be taken for granted.

Students are overscheduled these days; their lives are too busy. PACE students have always had extracurriculars: sports, music, drama, robotics, community service, and countless others. But now we have the constant presence of the online, plugged in, relentless interruption of Instagram, Facebook, Twitter, whatever. Kids are constantly watching and being watched, distracted and disjointed, deprived of the experience of deep thought and reflection by the unremitting onslaught of whatever it is that seems so compelling in this moment and will not matter in the least in the next few hours. And the kids are not alone. Parents likewise are multitasking, reading news feeds and tending to the chores of home while worrying about their own work and distractedly asking our kids, "What was that again, what did you say?" We all need to break away, put it all down, and reconnect to what will matter ultimately and to each other. This is hardly a unique observation or prescription, but its validity is becoming ever more apparent.

This past year I met with a student who felt he was falling behind in chemistry and was concerned about the efficiency of his study habits. In an effort to possibly streamline his routines, I asked him what he did when school was over each day, what he did when he went home in the afternoon. He told me he walked his dog. Each day, after he arrived home from school with mountains of homework to do, he walked his dog. That answer filled me with a burst of joy and hope. I could envision an uncluttered, genuinely essential experience of presence as my student tended to the dog he loves and for whom he feels responsible, and in so doing took time to tend his own soul. And so, as I sign off as the facilitator of this necessary program that it has been my duty and privilege to direct and protect, I will ask your indulgence as I offer advice to students and parents alike. Walk the dog, smell the flowers as you do so, revel in the opportunity to explore new vistas and learn continuously, recognize the gift of human ties and love, and receive my intense gratitude for your presence and your participation in PACE. I am honored to have known and worked with you. You have conferred unimaginable meaning to my life.

Farewell After 23 Years

When my middle school-aged daughter came home one day to tell me that she wanted to attend Poly High School to be part of the PACE program, I decided I had better go check it out. After all, the school was far from our home and not in the most celebrated of Long Beach neighborhoods. But it took precisely one day of visiting the campus, speaking with students and teachers, looking in on classes, feeling the energy on campus that I now know as "Poly Pride" for me to report back to her that not only would I be happy for her to attend the school as part of PACE, but that I also was prepared to seek a second career and become a high school teacher at that vibrant, bustling, wondrous high school. The place just seemed more vital and interesting than any place I could imagine. I enrolled at the CSULB science-credentialing program the very next day with the goal of teaching at Poly PACE. And thus began the odyssey that would occupy my thoughts, energy, and efforts for the next twenty-five years.

Now retired and looking back, I cannot imagine how better to have spent my working years. I recognized immediately in PACE the essential nature of its intent: to provide academically talented and motivated students the education they deserve and, indeed, require to satisfy the intense appetite for knowledge and learning that is inherent to a certain breed of person. Members of that breed may not even realize their affliction, which manifests as a subtle malaise unless they can experience intellectual challenge. With that challenge before them, this breed can experience excitement as they explore hitherto unknown terrain, acquiring knowledge and cognitive skills, and stretching the capability of their minds to analyze and ultimately understand all manner of human experience. Learning is essential to this breed; the opportunity to learn how to learn deeply is a gift of extraordinary value.

PACE is, frankly, unlikely. Why in the world would parents have sent their precious and gifted children to an inner city school plagued by racial unrest in 1975? Why would the most talented of teachers have agreed to assume the mantle of educating these children who required of them so much more: more depth, more thought and care in creating curriculum, more creativity in designing approaches to content, and more challenge to them intellectually? I have often described PACE as a boat that should never have floated. And vet. voila! Forty-three years later PACE continues to be the premier academic program in the region, producing scholars who go on to become the leaders of their prestigious colleges and ultimately their communities, enabled by mental habits acquired and assiduously groomed in this program and fueled by their own unalterable desire to learn and grow, continuously.

My years in the classroom with hundreds of different students has revealed to me that intelligence is so very much bigger and ineffable and amorphous than any linear scale can portray. What separates a true PACE student from others is less his or her innate intelligence, whatever that is, than a genuine love of learning and the unceasing determination to achieve.
